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Vorwort

Liebe Kolleginnen und Kollegen, liebe Eltern, liebe Schülerinnen und Schüler,

es freut mich sehr, dass Sie sich für dieses Heft und für die Lesespurgeschichten entschieden haben. Lesespurgeschichten sind eine tolle Möglichkeit, die **Lesekompetenz** bei Schülerinnen und Schülern zu fördern; zugleich wecken sie die **Freude am Lesen**. Für Schülerinnen und Schüler der **7. und 8. Klasse** sind sie ein nächster Schritt weg von den traditionellen Texten im Buch hin zu eigenen **Leseerfahrungen** in der Fremdsprache.

Hilfestellung zum Lesen von Lesespurgeschichten:

- 1: Zuerst liest man die kurze Einleitung und das Textstück Nummer 1.
- 2: Anschließend versucht man, durch den Hinweis im Text auf der Karte die nächste Nummer zu finden. Gelingt dies nicht direkt, kann man auch die nächsten Textabschnitte durchgucken und schauen, ob man Hinweise findet, dass hier die Geschichte weitergehen soll.
- 3: Dann liest man bei der nächsten Nummer weiter und schaut anschließend nochmals auf der Karte nach der nächsten Nummer. Dies wiederholt sich bis zum Schluss.
- 4: Findet man nicht die richtige Nummer, gibt der Textabschnitt einen deutlichen Hinweis, dass dies nicht die richtige Lesespur ist.

Differenzierung ist im Fremdsprachenunterricht ein wichtiges Thema. Aus diesem Grund liegt jede Geschichte in **zwei Niveaustufen** vor, einem einfacheren (1) und einem mittleren (2) Niveau. Das einfachere Niveau kann beispielsweise auch problemlos in der Real- oder Hauptschule eingesetzt werden. Die Textabschnitte des mittleren Niveaus sind etwas ausführlicher, verfügen über einen anspruchsvolleren Wortschatz und haben zusätzlich noch eingebaute Rätsel, die die Schülerinnen und Schüler lösen müssen.

Es empfiehlt sich, die erste Lesespurgeschichte mit den Schülerinnen und Schülern gemeinsam zu bearbeiten, damit ihnen das Format vertraut ist. Anschließend kann man sie die nächsten Geschichten problemlos **allein** oder in **Partnerarbeit** lösen lassen. Sie haben als Lehrkraft dann verschiedene **Kontrollmöglichkeiten**: Die Schülerinnen und Schüler können allein mithilfe der Lösungsseite kontrollieren, sie besprechen die richtige Lesespur gemeinsam am Ende im Plenum oder die Schülerinnen und Schüler kontrollieren sich gegenseitig mit der Sitznachbarin bzw. dem Sitznachbarn.

In der Vergangenheit hat sich herausgestellt, dass Lesespurgeschichten dadurch **verschiedene Lese- und** Lerntypen ansprechen, dass sie nicht nur Text enthalten, sondern der Text mit dem Entdecken der Spur auf der Karte kombiniert ist.




