Liebe Kolleginnen und Kollegen,

es freut mich sehr, dass die bereits erschienenen "Creepy Stories" (Produktnummer 12994) Gefallen bei Ihnen und Ihren Schülern gefunden haben. Ich verwende das Lernbegleitheft auch gerne in meinem Unterricht. Im Zuge dessen erzählen mir die Schüler immer wieder ähnliche gruselige Stories, die sie selbst erlebt haben. Dadurch werden spielend Sprechanlässe aus der Welt der Schüler geschaffen. Diese – für die Lernenden wie für mich – motivierende Erfahrung brachte mich auf die Idee, einen zweiten Teil der "Creepies" zu verfassen.

"Creepy Stories – The beginning" soll ein jüngeres Publikum ansprechen und ist eigentlich der Vorläufer des ersten Teiles. Das Niveau entspricht dem Level A2. Die Leseverständnisübungen sind so aufgebaut, dass auf jede Erzählung eine Vokabelerarbeitung folgt, da Wörter und Phrasen essenziell für das Erlernen einer Fremdsprache sind. Danach folgen differenzierte Übungen zum Leseverständnis, aber auch Grammatikübungen kommen nicht zu kurz. Der Schwerpunkt liegt im Bereich der Zeitform "Simple Past".

Die Illustrationen stammen von meinem Sohn Finn und dessen Freundin Noreen.


